

ANGOLA

Smoking Out!



Angolan Customs has adopted baggage screening for a decade and has achieved important goals, including seizures of drugs, money laundering, cash smuggling and products that endanger the lives of passengers. In 2017, 13 seizures were made, totalling 51kgs of narcotic drugs, from the expertise of our officials with the support of the scanners.

The scanners aim to support the maximization of baggage screening and other technologies that contribute to increasing revenue and protecting the society by identifying undeclared merchandise as well as holding prohibited goods.



BOTSWANA

Sniffed Out



The picture depicts a Customs search dog jumping into a truck through a window, to conduct a search. Detection of undeclared and sometimes illegal substances, often concealed inside vehicles and other places, has significantly improved since the acquisition and use of dogs by Customs in Botswana.



BURUNDI

Presidential Honour



President of the Republic of Burundi H. E. Pierre Nkurunziza joined the OOB on December 5, 2017, in celebrating the second edition of the Taxpayers' Day and awarded the Prize of Excellence to BRARUDI. BRARUDI, the first industrial beer production industry in Burundi, is one of the enterprises participating in the AEO program and has been chosen as a model for customs and fiscal compliance.



COMOROS

Crowd Puller



The most popular Comorian Customs Officer, Mr. Ibouroi (last on the row), a 41-year-old dwarf, in full training among the agents of the Surveillance Brigade.



ETHIOPIA

Coked Out



The photo displays about 12 kgs of cocaine dusted on a white towel dipped into a bucket, which contains cocaine powder, steered in water and then packed after drying. It was seized at Addis Ababa's Bole International Airport while being trafficked into Ethiopia from Brazil on 20th December 2017.



KENYA

TopGear Revealed



On 4th September 2017, Customs Enforcement Southern Region intercepted a high value consignment in which three high-end motor vehicles were suspected to be concealed. The container arrived at the Port of Mombasa on 3rd September 2017, aboard MV. Noro from Felixstowe, United Kingdom. The manifest declared bags of skateboarding equipment, 85 bags of soft baby toys, 14 castles, 85 boxes of tennis equipment, 85 boxes of cricket bat and skate equipment. Scanner image and actual verification revealed concealed three high-end vehicles.

MALAWI

Compressed Dope



On 23rd March 2018, Malawi Customs officers stationed at the Kamuzu International Airport (KIA) seized a consignment of 29 compressors concealing 13.5kg of dangerous drugs called Apomorphine.



MAURITIUS

Mauritian Prime Minister Mr. Pravind Kumar Jugnauth paying tribute to the customs officers who on a 24/7 basis ensure that the country is protected from entry of illegal substances with the K9 unit and other latest technology.



MOZAMBIQUE

Runaway Moolah



These two trucks were apprehended by Mozambique Custom Mobile Team in one of the routes that connects Mozambique to South Africa. Inside one of the trucks carrying energetic beverages, there were undeclared items, such as milk, juice, coffee and infant food worth about R580,000 (about USD. 50,000). The second truck carried powder soap and mayonnaise declared for customs duties and tax payment within the Preferential Treatment, under SADC Trade Protocol but with a false Certificate of Origin.



RWANDA

Hidden Treasure



Fatal Blow



It works in complementing measures in place to fight smuggling such as use of scanners, border patrols, roadblocks in conjunction with law enforcement agencies, cargo tracking, risk profiling, and information dissemination..
