

1. Angola – Horny Business





During boarding flight VN88 bound for Vietnam, a physical inspection of the luggage of a 58-year-old male passenger from Vietnam was carried out in the container area at the International Airport 4 de Fevereiro in Luanda, and wildlife products were found, namely 439 (four hundred and thirtynine) feline teeth and 8 (eight) rhino horns, with absence of the official LICENSE /CITES Certificate (Convention on International Trade in Endan-

gered Species of Wild Fauna and Flora. Such conduct is a violation of Presidential Decree 311/18 of 19 December, which approves the Regulation on the import, export reexport of endangered species of wild fauna and flora, as well as presidential legislative decree No. 10/19 of 29 November, which approves the Customs Tariff of Import and Export Duties, since it is a prohibited commodity, pursuant to Article 75.

2. Burundi – Customed Pilot





A female Customs officer trained to pilot a surveillance boat to counter smuggling on Lake Tanganyika during a training held in Bujumbura on 19th April 2021.

3. Ethiopia – Fishy Business





Ethiopian Customs Commission employees at border check points committed searching illegal goods entering to the country.

4. Kenya – Cannabis Cookie









On 23/02/2021 at around 12:00hrs, Enforcement team at City Square and KRA K9 suspected one parcel to contain some concealment, K9 sniffed and responded positively, a Multi-agency team was called and interception was done at 11:00 am on 24th March 2021. A consignment

was for Sierra Char, originating from United Kingdom which was declared as Cosmetics. During interception, 2pkgs found to have Cannabis Cookies and High Cannabis Cookies, preliminary test shows the presence of Marijuana, which is a prohibited substance.

5. Madagascar - Sniffy Officer





Accompanied by his Master, this canine agent is involved in his flair and energy in his work to detect prohibited goods.

6. Malawi – Gone Bananas









Smugglers are devising sophisticated means of concealing goods. Despite the COVID-19 Pandemic, Customs Officers at the Malawi Revenue Authority are still vigilant in curbing smuggling as seen in the photo where energy drinks were concealed in a banana consignment.

7. Mauritius – COVID Hunters





On this time of world pandemic COVID-19, our officers are taking all the necessary precaution such as wearing of masks, face shield, disposable overall and gloves, sanitizers, also after each rummage, electro-magnetic sanitizing sprayer are used to sanitize our officers and their respective Personal Protective Equipment(PPE).

On 19.03.2021, a rummage was mounted to search a suspicious vessel; last ports: Oman, Seychelles and Madagascar. The vessel was of Indonesian flag and all the crew

members were Indonesian. The said vessel was moored at Mauritius Container terminal and during the search, our officers found concealed inside the air vent two plastic parcels wrapped with brown sealed taped suspected to contain Heroin of a Gross indicated weight 2kg.

The MRA drone and Customs Fast Interceptor boats were used for surveillance and intelligence near the cargo Vessel. Sniffer Dogs from the MRA K9 Unit were also deployed during this rummage operation.

8. Rwanda – Sanitizing Agenda









The above pictures are for Kiyanzi site, a dry port operationalized on 28th April 2020 7km away from Rusumo border as part of the government's strategies to prevent the spread of COVID-19 in Rwanda while facilitating the continuous movement of essential goods across the region. The objective of this port was to extend customs clearance services near the border. All trucks entering through Kiyanzi were decontaminated as shown in the picture above. Medical screening and testing was available for customs staff, stakeholders and truck drivers.

9. South Africa - Faithful friend







Customs Lands Modality

The Customs & Excise mandate is to be the first line of control over the movement of goods across our country's borders and to ensure that all Excisable goods manufactured and administered within the country are correctly accounted for and compliant with the policies and laws of the state. Key functions are Control and Customs Enforcement.

11. Zambia – State Guard






